

CANADIAN POWERLIFTING

UNION BY-LAWS

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Effective May 26, 2024

ARTICLE I: GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. Purpose – These By-laws relate to the general conduct of the affairs of Canadian Powerlifting Union, a Canadian Corporation.
2. Definitions – The following terms have these meanings in these By-laws:
 - a) *Act* – the Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act, S.C. 2009, c.23, including the Regulations made pursuant to the Act, and any statutes or regulations that may be substituted, as amended from time to time;
 - b) *Annual Meeting* – the annual meeting of the Members;
 - c) *Articles* – the original or restated articles of incorporation or articles of amendment, amalgamation, continuance, reorganization, arrangement, or revival of the Corporation;
 - d) *Auditor* – a Public Accountant, as defined in the Act, appointed by the Members by Ordinary Resolution at the Annual Meeting to audit the books, accounts, and records of the Corporation for a report to the Members at the next Annual Meeting;
 - e) *Board* – the Board of Directors of the Corporation;
 - f) *Corporation* – Canadian Powerlifting Union;
 - g) *Days* – days including weekends and holidays;
 - h) *Director* – an individual elected or appointed to serve on the Board pursuant to these By-laws;
 - i) *Fundamental Changes* – amendments or other changes to the Corporation that are designated by the Act to be “fundamental changes”;
 - j) *Member* – those entities meeting the definition of Member that are admitted as Members of the Corporation under these By-laws;
 - k) *Officer* – an individual elected or appointed to serve as an Officer of the Corporation pursuant to these By-laws;
 - l) *Ordinary Resolution* – a resolution passed by a majority of the votes cast on that resolution;
 - m) *Registrant* - individuals who are engaged in activities that are provided, sponsored, supported or sanctioned by an Association Member and may include, but are not limited to including, recreational and competitive athletes, members of national teams, coaches, officials, event organizers, administrators of provincial and territorial clubs, and volunteers who serve on club executives, committees and boards of directors;
 - n) *Regulations* – the regulations made under the Act, as amended, restated or in effect from time to time; and
 - o) *Special Resolution* – a resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the votes cast on that resolution.
3. Registered Office – The Registered Office of the Corporation will be located in the province of Alberta at such address as the Board may determine.
4. No Gain for Members – The Corporation will be carried on without the purpose of gain for its Members and any profits or other accretions to the Corporation will be used in promoting its objectives.
5. Ruling on By-laws – Except as provided in the Act, the Board will have the authority to interpret any provision of these By-laws that is contradictory, ambiguous, or unclear, provided

such interpretation is consistent with the objectives, mission, vision and values of the Corporation.

6. Conduct of Meetings – Unless otherwise specified in the Act or these By-laws, meetings of Members and meetings of the Board will be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order* (current edition).
7. Interpretation – Words importing the singular will include the plural and vice versa, words importing the masculine will include the feminine and vice versa, and words importing persons will include bodies corporate. Words importing an organization name, title, or program will include any successor organizational name, title, or program.
8. Language – The Corporation shall recognize Canada's two official languages, namely French and English, equally. These By-laws have been drafted in English and the official French text is a translation. In the case of conflicting interpretations, the English version will prevail.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

Membership Categories

1. Categories – The Corporation has the following categories of Members:
 - a) Association Member
 - b) Executive Member
2. Association Member – An organization, association or corporation recognized by the Corporation as the sole governing body for powerlifting in that Province or Territory, is registered as a member of the Corporation and has agreed to abide by the Corporation's By-laws, policies, procedures, rules and regulations.
3. Executive Member – An individual who is a Director of the Corporation and who has agreed to abide by the Corporation's By-laws, policies, procedures, rules and regulations.

Admission of Members

4. Admission of Members – Any candidate will be admitted as a Member if:
 - a) The candidate member makes an application for membership in a manner prescribed by the Corporation;
 - b) The candidate member was at any time previously a Member, the candidate member was a Member in good standing at the time of ceasing to be a Member;
 - c) The candidate member has paid dues as prescribed by the Board;
 - d) The candidate member has met the applicable definition listed in Section 2.2 – 2.3, as applicable; and
 - e) The candidate member has been approved by majority vote as a Member by the Board or by any committee or individual delegated this authority by the Board.
5. Change of Terms/Conditions of Membership – Pursuant to the sections of the Act applicable to Fundamental Changes, a Special Resolution of the Members is required to make any amendments if those amendments affect the following membership rights and/or conditions:
 - a) Change a condition required for being a Member;

- b) Change in the manner of giving notice to Members entitled to vote at a meeting of Members; or
- c) Change the method of voting by Members not in attendance at a meeting of Members.

Transfer of Membership

- 6. Transfer – Any interest arising out of membership in the Corporation is not transferable.

Rights of Members

- 7. General Rights of the Members
 - a) Right to Participate: Every Member has the right to attend any event or competition organized or sanctioned by the Corporation.
 - b) Right to Information: Members have the right to access information related to the governance and financial status of the Corporation, including but not limited to minutes of all meetings, financial reports, and strategic plans.
 - c) Right to Vote: Each Member shall have the right to vote at the Annual Meeting and any Special Meetings, as outlined in the “Voting at Meetings of Member” section of these bylaws.
 - d) Right to Nominate: Members have the right to nominate individuals for positions on the Board of Directors, in accordance with the nomination procedures outlined in these bylaws.
 - e) Right to be Heard: Members have the right to voice their opinions, suggestions, or grievances to the Board of Directors through the appropriate channels as defined by the Corporation.
 - f) Right to Petition: Members have the right to petition the Board for changes in policy, rules, or conduct of the Corporation.
 - g) Right to Question: Members have the right to question the Board of Directors on their actions and decisions.
 - h) Right to Audit: Members have the right to request an independent audit of the Corporation’s financials, subject to approval by a majority vote.
 - i) Right to Due Process: Members subject to disciplinary action have the right to a fair and impartial hearing.
 - j) Right to Appeal: Members have the right to appeal any decision affecting their membership status, including disciplinary actions and termination.

Duration

- 8. Duration of Membership – Association Membership is accorded on an annual basis as determined by the Board of Directors, and all Members, will re-apply for membership each year. Executive Membership is accorded for the length of the Director’s term.

Membership Dues

- 9. Dues – Membership dues for all categories of membership will be determined annually by the Board.

10. Deadline – Members will be notified in writing of the membership dues at any time payable by them, and if they are not paid within sixty (60) days of the membership renewal date, the Member in default will automatically cease to be a Member of the Corporation.

Withdrawal and Termination of Membership

11. Withdrawal and Termination – Membership in the Corporation is terminated when:
 - a) The Member, in the case of a Member that is a corporation, dissolves;
 - b) The Member, in the case of a Member that is an individual, dies;
 - c) The Member fails to maintain any of the qualifications or conditions of membership described in Sections 2.2 - 2.3, as applicable, of these By-laws;
 - d) The Member resigns from the Corporation by giving written notice to the Secretary, in which case the resignation becomes effective on the date specified in the resignation. The Member will be responsible for all fees payable until the actual withdrawal becomes effective;
 - e) By Ordinary Resolution of the Board or of the Members at a duly called meeting, provided fifteen (15) days notice is given and the Member is provided with reasons and the opportunity to be heard. Notice will set out the reasons for termination of membership and the member receiving the notice will be entitled to submit a written submission opposing the termination;
 - f) The Member's term of membership expires; or
 - g) The Corporation is liquidated or dissolved under the Act.
12. May Not Resign – A Member may not resign from the Corporation if the Member is subject to disciplinary investigation or action.
13. Discipline – A Member may be suspended or expelled from the Corporation in accordance with the Corporation's policies and procedures relating to the discipline of Members.
14. Arrears – A Member will be expelled from the Corporation for failing to pay membership dues or monies owed to the Corporation by the deadline dates prescribed by the Corporation.

Good Standing

15. Definition – A Member of the Corporation will be in good standing provided that the Member:
 - a) Has not ceased to be a Member;
 - b) Has not been suspended or expelled from membership, or had other restrictions or sanctions imposed;
 - c) Has completed and remitted all documents as required by the Corporation;
 - d) Has complied with the By-laws, policies, procedures, rules and regulations of the Corporation;
 - e) Is not subject to a disciplinary investigation or action by the Corporation, or if subject to disciplinary action previously, has fulfilled all terms and conditions of such disciplinary action to the satisfaction of the Board; and
 - f) Has paid all required membership dues or debts to the Corporation, if any.
16. Cease to be in Good Standing – Members who cease to be in good standing may have privileges suspended and will not be entitled to vote at meetings of Members or be entitled to the

benefits and privileges of membership until such time as the Board is satisfied that the Member has met the definition of good standing as set out above.

ARTICLE III: MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

1. Types of Meetings – Meetings of Members will include Annual Meetings and Special Meetings.
2. Special Meeting – The agenda of a Special Meeting will be limited to the subject matter for which the meeting was duly called. A Special Meeting of the Members may be called at any time by:
 - a) the President,
 - b) the Board, or
 - c) Members, upon written requisition, who hold five percent (5%) of the votes of the Corporation.
3. Location and Date – The Corporation will hold meetings of Members at such date, time and place as determined by the Board. The Annual Meeting will be held within fifteen (15) months of the last Annual Meeting but not later than six (6) months after the end of the Corporation's preceding financial year.
4. Meetings by Electronic Means – A meeting of Members may be held by means of telephone, electronic or other communication facility that permits all participants to communicate adequately with each other during the meeting, if the Corporation makes available such a communication facility.
5. Participation in Meetings by Electronic Means – Any Member entitled to vote at a meeting of Members may participate in the meeting by means of telephone, an electronic or other communication facility that permits all participants to communicate adequately with each other during the meeting, if the Corporation makes available such a communication facility. A person so participating in a meeting is deemed to be present at the meeting.
6. Notice – Notice will include the time and place of a meeting, the proposed agenda, reasonable information to permit Members to make informed decisions, and will be given to each Member entitled to vote at the meeting, the auditor, and the Board, by the following means:
 - a) By mail, courier or personal delivery to each Member entitled to vote at the meeting, during a period of thirty (30) days before the day on which the meeting is to be held; or
 - b) By telephone, electronic or other communication facility to each member entitled to vote at the meeting, during a period of thirty (30) days before the day on which the meeting is to be held; or
 - c) By posting on the Corporation's website not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of the meeting.

7. Change in Notice Requirements – Pursuant to the sections of the Act applicable to Fundamental Changes, a Special Resolution of the Members may be required to make any amendment to the By-laws of the Corporation to change the manner of giving notice to Members entitled to vote at a meeting of Members.
8. Persons Entitled to Attend – Delegates representing Association Members, the Directors and the auditor of the Corporation and such other persons who are entitled or required under any provision of the Act, Articles or By-laws of the Corporation are entitled to be present at the meeting. Any other person may be admitted only on the invitation of the chair of the meeting or by resolution of the Members.
9. Adjournment – Any meetings of Members may be adjourned to any time and place as determined by the Board and such business may be transacted at such adjourned meeting as might have been transacted at the original meeting from which such adjournment took place. No notice will be required for any adjourned meeting.
10. Agenda – The agenda for the Annual Meeting will include:
 - a) Call to order
 - b) Determination of a quorum
 - c) Appointment of scrutineers
 - d) Approval of the agenda
 - e) Declaration of any conflicts of interest
 - f) Adoption of minutes of the previous Annual Meeting
 - g) Board, Committee and Staff reports
 - h) Report of Auditors
 - i) Appointment of Auditors
 - j) Nominations and voting for awards
 - k) Bids for future championships. Regional and National
 - l) Business as specified in the meeting notice
 - m) Election of new Directors
 - n) Adjournment
11. New Business – No other item of business will be included in the notice of the meeting of the Members unless notice in writing of such other item of business, or a Member’s proposal, has been submitted to the Board sixty (60) days prior to the meeting of the Members in accordance with procedures as approved by the Board. Copies of all such proposals together with copies of any amendments thereto then proposed by the Board and copies of all resolutions put forward by the Board shall be sent to all Members with the agenda and the notice calling an Annual Meeting.
12. All new proposals become effective one (1) month following the Annual Meeting. If the passed proposal requires more time to disseminate, an alternate effective date must be stated as part of the submission.
13. Quorum – A majority of Association Members and a majority of Executive Members will constitute a quorum. If a quorum is present at the opening of a meeting of the Members, the Members present may proceed with the business of the meeting, even if a quorum is not present throughout the meeting.

Voting at Meetings of Members

1. Voting Privileges – Members will have the following voting rights at all meetings of Members:
 - a) Association Members will each be entitled to appoint two (2) Delegates who may attend meetings of Members and exercise two (2) votes on behalf of the Member, one (1) vote per Delegate.
 - b) Executive Members will be entitled to attend meetings of Members and will have one (1) vote each.
2. Delegates – Association Members will appoint in writing (inclusive of electronic notice) to the Corporation, at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting of Members, the name of the Delegates that will represent the Member. Delegates must be at least eighteen years of age and a Director of the Association Member.
3. Delegate Voting – At the discretion of the Association Member, one Delegate may carry both the votes of an Association Member.
16. Proxy Voting – Members may vote by proxy if:
 - a) The Member notified the Corporation in writing at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting of the Members of an appointment of a proxy holder;
 - b) The proxy is received by the Corporation prior to the start of the meeting;
 - c) The proxy clearly states the date of the specific meeting; and
 - d) The proxy clearly states to whom the proxy is given.
17. Maximum Number of Proxies – No Member will hold more than one (1) proxy vote.
18. Absentee Voting – A Member may vote in writing in advance of the meeting of the Members on published proposed resolutions and for the election of Directors by so indicating the vote to the Secretary, in a form prescribed by the Corporation, prior to the vote being taken.
19. Voting by Mail or Electronic Means – A Member may vote by mail, or by telephonic or electronic means if:
 - a) The votes may be verified as having been made by the Member entitled to vote; and
 - b) The Corporation is not able to identify how each Member voted.
20. Scrutineers – At the beginning of each meeting, the Board may appoint one or more scrutineers who will be responsible for ensuring that votes are properly cast and counted.
21. Determination of Votes – Votes will be determined by a show of hands, orally or electronic ballot, except in the case of elections which require a secret ballot, unless a secret or recorded ballot is requested by a Member.
22. Majority of Votes – Except as otherwise provided in the Act or these By-laws, the majority of votes and proxy votes cast will decide each issue. In the case of a tie, the issue is defeated.

ARTICLE IV: GOVERNANCE

Composition of the Board

1. Directors – The Board will consist of five (5) Directors as follows:
 - a) President
 - b) Executive Vice-President, Program Director
 - c) Executive Vice-President, Sport Development
 - d) Treasurer
 - e) Secretary

Eligibility of Directors

2. Eligibility
 - a) Age and Residency: Must be eighteen (18) years of age or older and a resident of Canada as defined in the Income Tax Act.
 - b) Legal Capacity: Must have the power under law to contract.
 - c) Mental Capacity: Must not have been declared incapable by a court in Canada or in another country.
 - d) Non-Association with Other Boards: Must not be serving as a board member for an Association Member, the International Powerlifting Federation or any other governing body whose interests may not align with that of Corporation.
 - e) Good Standing: Must be a registrant in good standing with an Association Member.
 - f) Financial Status: Must not have the status of bankrupt.

Individuals must be registrants in the CPU in order to be eligible to serve as Executive Committee Members.

Election of Directors

3. Nominations Committee – The Board will appoint a Nominations Committee. The Nominations Committee will be responsible to solicit nominations for the election of the Directors.
4. Nomination Process – The process for nominating an individual for election as a Director shall adhere to the following criteria:
 - a) Nominations must be made by a party other than the nominee. Self-nominations are not permitted.
 - b) Include the written consent of the nominee by signed or electronic signature;
 - c) Comply with the procedures established by the Nominations Committee; and
 - d) Be submitted to the Registered Office of the Corporation seven (7) days prior to the Annual Meeting. This timeline may be extended by Ordinary Resolution of the Board.
5. Nominations from the Floor – Nominations for elections of a Director will only be accepted from the floor if there is not a candidate meeting the requirements defined in Section 4.4.

6. Incumbents – Individuals currently on the Board of Directors wishing to be re-elected are not subject to nomination.
7. Single Nomination (Rule) - Directors who wish to seek election to a different position on the Board are subject to the eligibility and nominations process outlined in these bylaws, and concurrently relinquish their existing position at the conclusion of the election process.
 - a) Should the member be elected to the new position, they will assume the responsibilities and duties of the new role following the election meeting.
 - b) In the event the member is not elected to the new role, the position they relinquished will be treated as vacant and subject to the procedures outlined in section 4.16 of these bylaws regarding board vacancies.
8. Circulation of Nominations - Valid nominations and their election platform messages will be circulated to Members by electronic means five (5) days prior to the Annual Meeting.
9. Election - The election of directors will take place at an Annual Meeting of Members. The next three election years are stated for each position below and will continue on this cycle after these dates.
 - a) Executive Vice-President Program Director and Treasurer (2025, 2028, 2031)
 - b) Executive Vice-President Sport Development and Secretary (2026, 2029, 2032)
 - c) President (2027, 2030, 2033)
10. Decision – Elections will be decided by the Members in accordance with the following:
 - a) One Valid Nomination – Winner declared by acclamation.
 - b) Two or More Valid Nominations – The nominee(s) receiving the greatest number of votes will be elected. In the case of a tie, the nominee receiving the fewest votes will be deleted from the list of nominees and a second vote will be conducted. If there continues to be a tie and more nominees than positions, the nominee receiving the fewest votes will be deleted from the list of nominees until there remains the appropriate number of nominees for the position(s) or until a winner is declared. If there continues to be a tie then the winner(s) will be declared by Ordinary Resolution of the Board.
11. Terms – Elected Directors will hold office for a term of three (3) years and will hold office until their successors have been duly elected in accordance with these By-laws, unless they resign, or are removed from or vacate their office.
12. First Elections – The first elections following the Corporation’s transition to compliance with the *Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act* will be held after the expiration of the terms of the current elected Directors.

Suspension, Resignation and Removal of Directors

13. Resignation – A Director may resign from the Board at any time by presenting his or her written notice of resignation to the Board. This resignation will become effective the date on which the request is accepted by the Board. If a Director who is subject to a disciplinary

investigation or action of the Corporation resigns, that Director will nonetheless be subject to any sanctions or consequences resulting from the disciplinary investigation or action.

14. Vacate Office – The office of any Director will be vacated automatically if the Director:
 - a) Is found by a court to be of unsound mind;
 - b) Becomes bankrupt, suspends payment, or compounds with his or her creditors, or makes unauthorized assignment, or is declared insolvent;
 - c) Is charged and/or convicted of any criminal offence related to the position;
 - d) Changes his or her permanent residence outside of Canada; or
 - e) Dies.
15. Removal – A Director may be removed by Ordinary Resolution of the Members at an Annual Meeting or Special Meeting, provided the Director has been given notice of and the opportunity to be heard at such a meeting. If the Director is removed and holds a position as an Officer, the Director will automatically and simultaneously be removed from his or her position as an Officer.
16. Suspension – A Director may be suspended, pending the outcome of a discipline hearing in accordance with the Corporation’s policies related to discipline, by Special Resolution of the Board at a meeting of the Board, provided the Director has been given notice of and the opportunity to be heard at such meeting.

Filling a Vacancy on the Board

17. Vacancy – When the position of a Director becomes vacant for whatever reason and if there are more than 60 days until the Annual Meeting of Members the position must be filled. If there is still a quorum of Directors, the Board may appoint a qualified individual to fill the position for the remainder of the term. Alternatively, the Board may decide, by Ordinary Resolution, that one or more Directors will execute the duties of the vacant Director position for the remainder of the unexpired term. If a Director is removed by the Members at a meeting of the Members, the Members may elect a Director to fill the unexpired term at the same meeting

Meetings

18. Call of Meeting – Meetings of the Board will be held any time and place as determined by the Board.
19. Notice – Notice of meetings of the Board will be given to all Directors at least five (5) days prior to the scheduled meeting. No notice of a meeting of the Board is required if all Directors waive notice, or if those absent consent to the meeting being held in their absence.
20. Number of Meetings – The Board will hold at least one (1) meeting per fiscal year.
21. Quorum – At any meeting of the Board, quorum will consist of three (3) Directors.
22. Voting – Each Director, in attendance or participating, is entitled to one vote. Voting will be by a show of hands, orally or by electronic ballot, unless a majority of Directors present request

a secret ballot. Resolutions will be passed upon a majority of the votes being in favour of the resolution. In the case of a tie, the President will declare that the resolution has not been decided and will set a date for further deliberation. After further deliberation, if the vote remains tied, the President will vote again to break the tie.

23. Absentee Voting – There will be no absentee or proxy voting by Directors.
24. Closed Meetings – Meetings of the Board will be closed to Members and the public except by invitation of the Board.
25. Meetings by Telecommunications – A meeting of the Board may take place by teleconference upon the consent of the Directors.
26. Meetings by Other Electronic Means – The Directors may meet by other electronic means that permit each Director to communicate adequately with each other provided that:
 - a) The Directors have passed a resolution addressing the mechanics of holding such a meeting and dealing specifically with how security issues should be handled, the procedure for establishing a quorum and for recording votes;
 - b) Each Director has access to the specific means of communications to be used;
 - c) Each Director has consented in advance to meeting by electronic means using the specific means of communication proposed for the meeting.
27. Meetings by Telephone – Any Director who is unable to attend a meeting may participate in the meeting by telephone or other telecommunications technology. Directors who participate in a meeting by telephone or other telecommunications technology are considered to have attended the meeting.

Powers of the Board

28. Powers – Except as otherwise provided in the Act or these By-laws, the Board has the powers of the Corporation and may delegate any of its powers, duties and functions.
29. Empowered – The Board is empowered to:
 - a) a) Make policies and procedures changes or additions, in consultation with the Association Members to manage the affairs of the Corporation in accordance with the Act and these By-laws;
 - b) b) Make policies and procedures changes or additions - in consultation with the Association Members relating to the discipline of Members and Registrants.
 - c) c) Has the authority to discipline Members and Registrants in accordance with the policies and procedures.
 - d) d) Make policies and procedures changes or additions in consultation with the Association Members relating to the management of disputes within the Corporation and deal with disputes in accordance with such policies and procedures;
 - e) Employ or engage under contract such persons as it deems necessary to carry out the work of the Corporation;
 - f) Determine registration procedures and membership fees, dues, assessments, charges, and other registration requirements.
 - g) Borrow money upon the credit of the Corporation as it deems necessary in accordance with these By-laws; and

h) Perform any other duties from time to time as may be in the best interests of the Corporation.

4.29 Whenever CPU bylaws, policies and procedures are updated by the Board, the Association Members will promptly be alerted of those specific changes.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS

1. Composition – The Officers will be composed of the President, Executive Vice President Program Director, Executive Vice-President Sport Development, Secretary, Treasurer.
2. Duties – The duties of Officers are prescribed by the Board.
3. Delegation of Duties – At the discretion of the Officer and with approval by Ordinary Resolution of the Board, any Officer may delegate any duties of that office to appropriate staff of the Corporation.
4. Removal – An Officer may be removed by Special Resolution of the Board or by Ordinary Resolution of the Members in a meeting, provided the Officer has been given notice of and the opportunity to be present and to be heard at the meeting where such Resolution is put to a vote. If the Officer is removed by the Members, his or her position as a Director will automatically and simultaneously be terminated.
5. Vacancy – Where the position of an Officer becomes vacant for whatever reason and there is still a quorum of Directors, the Board may, by Ordinary Resolution, appoint a qualified individual to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the vacant position's term of office.

ARTICLE VI: COMMITTEES

1. Appointment of Committees – The Board may appoint such Committees as it deems necessary for managing the affairs of the Corporation and may appoint members of Committees or provide for the election of members of Committees, may prescribe the duties of Committees, and may delegate to any Committee any of its powers, duties, and functions except where prohibited by the Act or these By-laws.
2. Quorum – A quorum for any Committee will be a majority of its voting members.
3. Terms of Reference – The Board may establish the terms of reference and operating procedures for all Committees, and may delegate any of its powers, duties, or functions to any Committee.
4. Vacancy – When a vacancy occurs on any Committee, the Board may appoint a qualified individual to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the Committee's term.
5. President Ex-officio – The President will be an *ex-officio* (non-voting) member of all Committees of the Corporation.

6. Removal – The Board may remove any member of any Committee.
7. Debts – No Committee will have the authority to incur debts in the name of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VII: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

7.1 Conflict of Interest – In accordance with the Act, a Director, Officer, or member of a Committee who has an interest, or who may be perceived as having an interest, in a proposed contract or transaction with the Corporation will comply with the Act and the Corporation’s policies and procedures and will disclose fully and promptly the nature and extent of such interest to the Board or Committee, as the case may be, will refrain from voting or speaking in debate on such contract or transaction, will refrain from influencing the decision on such contract or transaction, and will otherwise comply with the requirements of the Act regarding conflict of interest.

ARTICLE VIII: FINANCE AND MANAGEMENT

1. Fiscal Year – The fiscal year of the Corporation will be January 1st to December 31st, or such other period as the Board may from time to time determine.
2. Bank – The banking business of the Corporation will be conducted at such financial institution as the Board may designate.
3. Auditor – At each Annual Meeting, the Members will appoint, by Ordinary Resolution, an auditor to audit the books, accounts and records of the Corporation in accordance with the Act. The auditor will hold office until the next Annual Meeting. The auditor will not be an employee or a Director of the Corporation but will have remuneration fixed by the Directors.
4. Annual Financial Statements - The Corporation will send to the Members a copy of the annual financial statements and other documents referred to in the Act. Instead of sending the documents, the Corporation may send a summary to each Member along with a notice informing the Member of the procedure for obtaining a copy of the documents themselves free of charge. The Corporation is not required to send the documents or a summary to a Member who, in writing, declines to receive such documents.
5. Books and Records – The necessary books and records of the Corporation required by these By-laws or by applicable law will be necessarily and properly kept. Minutes of meetings of the Board and records of the Corporation may be available to the general membership of the Corporation but will be available to the Directors, each of whom will receive a copy of such minutes. All other books and records will be available for viewing at the Registered Office of the Corporation in accordance with the Act.
6. Signing Authority – Contracts, agreements, deeds, leases, mortgages, charges, conveyances, transfers and assignments of property, leases and discharges for the payment of money or other obligations, conveyances, transfers and assignments of shares, stocks, bonds, debentures, or other securities, agencies, powers of attorney, instruments of proxy, voting certificates, returns, documents, reports, or any other instruments in writing to be executed by the Corporation will be executed by at least one (1) of the Officers or other individuals, as

designated by the Board. In addition, the Board may direct a manner in which the person or persons by whom any particular instrument or class of instruments may or will be signed.

7. Property – The Corporation may acquire, lease, sell, or otherwise dispose of securities, lands, buildings, or other property, or any right or interest therein, for such consideration and upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine.
8. Borrowing - The Board may borrow money upon the credit of the Corporation, after ascertaining consent from the Members by way of Ordinary Resolution, as it deems necessary:
 - a) From any bank, Corporation, firm or person, upon such terms, covenants and conditions at such times, in such sums, to such an extent and in such manner as the Board in its discretion may deem expedient;
 - b) To limit or increase the amount to be borrowed;
 - c) To issue or cause to be issued bonds, debentures or other securities of the Corporation and to pledge or sell the same for such sums, upon such terms, covenants and conditions and at such prices as may be deemed expedient by the Board;
 - d) To secure any such bond, debentures or other securities, or any other present or future borrowing or liability of the Corporation, by mortgage, charge or pledge of all or any currently owned or subsequently acquired real and personal, movable and immovable, property of the Corporation, and the undertaking and rights of the Corporation.
9. Remuneration – Directors will receive specified amounts of annual remuneration as written in the CPU Bylaws. All other Officers (with the exception of any staff of the Corporation who are appointed as Officers) and members of Committees will serve as such without remuneration and will not directly or indirectly receive any profit from their positions. Directors, Officers, and members of Committees may be paid reasonable expenses incurred by them in the performance of their duties. Nothing herein contained will be construed to preclude any Director, Officer or member of a Committee from serving the Corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

ARTICLE IX: AMENDMENT OF BY-LAWS

1. Directors Voting – Except for the items set out in the sections of the Act applicable to Fundamental Changes, these By-laws may be amended or repealed by Ordinary Resolution of the Directors at a meeting of the Board. The Directors will submit the By-law, amendment or repeal to the members at the next meeting of Members, and the Members may by a majority affirmative vote confirm, reject or amend the By-laws. The By-law, amendment or repeal is effective from the date of the resolution of the Directors. If the By-law, amendment or repeal is confirmed, or confirmed as amended, by the Members it remains effective in the form in which it was confirmed.
2. Notice in Writing – Notice of proposed amendments to these By-laws will be provided to Members at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date of the meeting of the Members at which it is to be considered.

ARTICLE X: FUNDAMENTAL CHANGES

1. Fundamental Changes – In accordance with the sections of the Act applicable to Fundamental Changes, a Special Resolution of all Members may be required in order to make the following fundamental changes to the By-laws or Articles of the Corporation. Fundamental Changes are defined as follows:
 - a) Change the Corporation's name;
 - b) Change the province in which the Corporation's Registered Office is situated;
 - c) Add, change, or remove any restriction on the activities that the Corporation may carry on;
 - d) Create a new class or group of Members;
 - e) Change a condition required for being a Member;
 - f) Change the designation of any class or group of Members or add, change, or remove any rights and conditions of any such class or group;
 - g) Divide any class or group of Members into two or more classes or groups and fix the rights and conditions of each class or group;
 - h) Add, change, or remove a provision respecting the transfer of a membership;
 - i) Subject to the Act, increase or decrease the number of, or the minimum or maximum number of, Directors;
 - j) Change the statement of the purpose of the Corporation;
 - k) Change the statement concerning the distribution of property remaining on liquidation after the discharge of any liabilities of the Corporation;
 - l) Change the manner of giving notice to Members entitled to vote at a meeting of Members;
 - m) Change the method of voting by Members not in attendance at a meeting of Members; or
 - n) Add, change or remove any other provision that is permitted by the Act to be set out in the Articles.

2. Special Class Vote – The Act provides that each membership class is entitled to vote separately if the fundamental change noted above relates to membership rights, such as:
 - a) Effect an exchange, reclassification or cancellation of all or part of the memberships of the class or group;
 - b) Add, change or remove the rights or conditions attached to the memberships of the class or group, including
 - i. To reduce or remove a liquidation preference, or
 - ii. To add, remove or change prejudicially voting or transfer rights of the class or group;
 - c) Increase the rights of any other class or group of Members having rights equal or superior to those of the class or group;
 - d) Increase the rights of a class or group of Members having rights inferior to those of the class or group to make them equal or superior to those of the class or group;
 - e) Create a new class or group of Members having rights equal or superior to those of the class or group; or
 - f) Affect an exchange or create a right of exchange of all or part of the memberships of another class or group into the memberships of the class or group

3. Special Class Vote Result – Should any membership class not, by Special Resolution, approve a special class vote on a fundamental change, the issue is defeated.

ARTICLE XI: NOTICE

1. Written Notice – In these By-laws, written notice will mean notice which is hand-delivered or provided by mail, fax, electronic mail or courier to the address of record of the Corporation, Director, Member, or individual as the case may be.
2. Date of Notice – Date of notice will be the date on which receipt of the notice is confirmed verbally where the notice is hand-delivered, electronically where the notice is faxed or e-mailed, or in writing where the notice is couriered, or in the case of notice that is provided by mail, five (5) days after the date the mail is post-marked.
3. Error in Notice – The accidental omission to give notice of a meeting of the Board or the Members, the failure of any Director or Member to receive notice, or an error in any notice which does not affect its substance will not invalidate any action taken at the meeting.

ARTICLE XII: DISSOLUTION

- 12.1 Dissolution – Upon the dissolution of the Corporation, any funds or assets remaining after paying all debts will be distributed to an incorporated non-profit Canadian organization as determined by the Board.

ARTICLE XIII: INDEMNIFICATION

1. Will Indemnify – The Corporation will indemnify and hold harmless out of the funds of the Corporation each Director and Officer, their heirs, executors, and administrators from and against any and all claims, demands, actions or costs which may arise or be incurred as a result of occupying the position or performing the duties of a Director or Officer.
2. Will Not Indemnify – The Corporation will not indemnify a Director or Officer or any other person for illegal acts, acts of fraud, dishonesty, or bad faith.
3. Insurance – The Corporation will, at all times, maintain in force such directors and officers liability insurance as may be approved by the Board.

ARTICLE XIV: ADOPTION OF THESE BY-LAWS

1. Adoption by Board – These By-laws were adopted by the Board of the Corporation at a meeting of the Board duly called and held on September 3, 2014].
2. Ratification – These By-laws were ratified by the Members of the Corporation entitled to vote at a meeting of Members duly called and held on September 3, 2014].
3. Repeal of Prior By-laws – In ratifying these By-laws, the Members of the Corporation repeal all prior By-laws of the Corporation provided that such repeal does not impair the validity of any action done pursuant to the repealed By- laws.
